Henry David Thoreau

Henry David Thoreau was a famous American essayist, poet, and practical philosopher. He was born on July 12, 1817, in Concord, Massachusetts. He was the third child of a small businessman John Thoreau and his wife, Cynthia Dunbar Thoreau.

Thoreau was a good student and he entered Harvard University in 1833. There he studied Greek and Latin as well as German. He graduated in 1837 and he started working as a teacher at his old grammar school. After two weeks, he resigned and started working for his father in the family pencil-making business. In 1838, he started a small school with the help of his brother John. The school collapsed three years later after his brother became ill.

After college, Thoreau became friends with Ralph Waldo Emerson, an older poet and essayist. Thoreau saw in Emerson not only a friend, but also a guide. For a time, Thoreau lived with Emerson as a caretaker for his home.

In the 1840s, Thoreau published poems and essays in *The Dial*, an American literary magazine. In 1840, he fell in love with an attractive visitor to Concord named Ellen Sewall. He offered to marry her and she accepted him, but her parents didn't like the idea and so they didn't get married.

In 1845, Thoreau built a small home for himself on Walden Pond. He was twenty-seven years old at the time. He ate mostly beans, wild fruit and wild vegetables. He spent his time taking care of his plants, watching animals, fishing, swimming, reading, writing and doing other activities. In 1854, he published a book about his activities called *Walden; or, Life in the Woods*.

During his life in Walden, Thoreau spent one night in prison because he didn't pay taxes. This experience made him write one of his most famous essays, *Civil Disobedience*. A famous quote from this work says: "Under a government which imprisons any unjustly, the true place for a just man is also a prison." Thoreau was opposed to slavery and to Mexican-American War. He admired John Brown, a radical fighter against slavery.

In his later years, Thoreau was sick with tuberculosis. He died on May 6, 1862.
